AfrikaBurn, with all of its wonderful and weird experiences, is possibly a more real experience than what society would like to label as normal. In that way, the dream has become more real than reality. The event provides a space where people can freely create, connect and express themselves. AfrikaBurn's aim is to be inclusive and accessible to everyone, and people from all over the world come together to create temporary art works and enjoy a week of sharing, inspiring and creating. Sometimes, massive wooden art constructions are set up which are burnt towards the end of this week. People wear elaborate costumes and drive around in decorated mutant vehicles, while music and beats are heard all day long until late at night.

Photographer Isabel Corthier wanted to find out more about how the event helps to overcome differences, and how people connect with each other here in a different way than they would in their daily lives.

Since "the burn" is all about giving, Isabel's gift was a portrait. For four days she walked around the festival with her small Fujifilm X100f camera, asking people if she could give them a portrait right on the spot. No preparation — just pure, right there, who they are. In return, her gifts from them were their answers to her questions. Through this project, Isabel discovered that by eliminating prejudices and individualism and unburdening ourselves from too many responsibilities, we find the freedom to be our "real" selves and the desire to connect.

Wearing different clothes helps people to break out of their comfort zones and discover their real selves. As one "burner" said: "Dropping the mask by donning a costume, helps to drop the mask overall."

The fact that there's no cellphone coverage also makes people connect again, face to face. In the desert they depend on each other; especially because there's nothing for sale at the festival other than ice. AfrikaBurn is based purely on a "gifting" economy.

One woman said that she felt that everybody there had the desire to be there and wanted the same thing: to connect and to create, which then makes them want to connect more than in real life.

One young man summed it up perfectly: "AfrikaBurn becomes a story, a play that we all co-create in time and space, and through this creation we are joined in love, growth and enjoyment."

This year's AfrikaBurn festival will take place from 29th April to 5th May in the Tankwa Karoo National Park. **X**

The main difference with daily life for me is that I have no responsibilities here. It's an amazing opportunity to be in the here and now, to take time to live in the moment and just focus on being happy, finding your creative self, sharing your joy with others, giving something from yourself and getting to know yourself in a different way." – Vibeke

"Firstly, there's no cellphone coverage. This means that people communicate like God intended. Face to face. Secondly, the desert is a hostile environment. So, working together is a necessity for survival. Suddenly race, ethnicity, nationality, gender and just arrogance are swept away.
